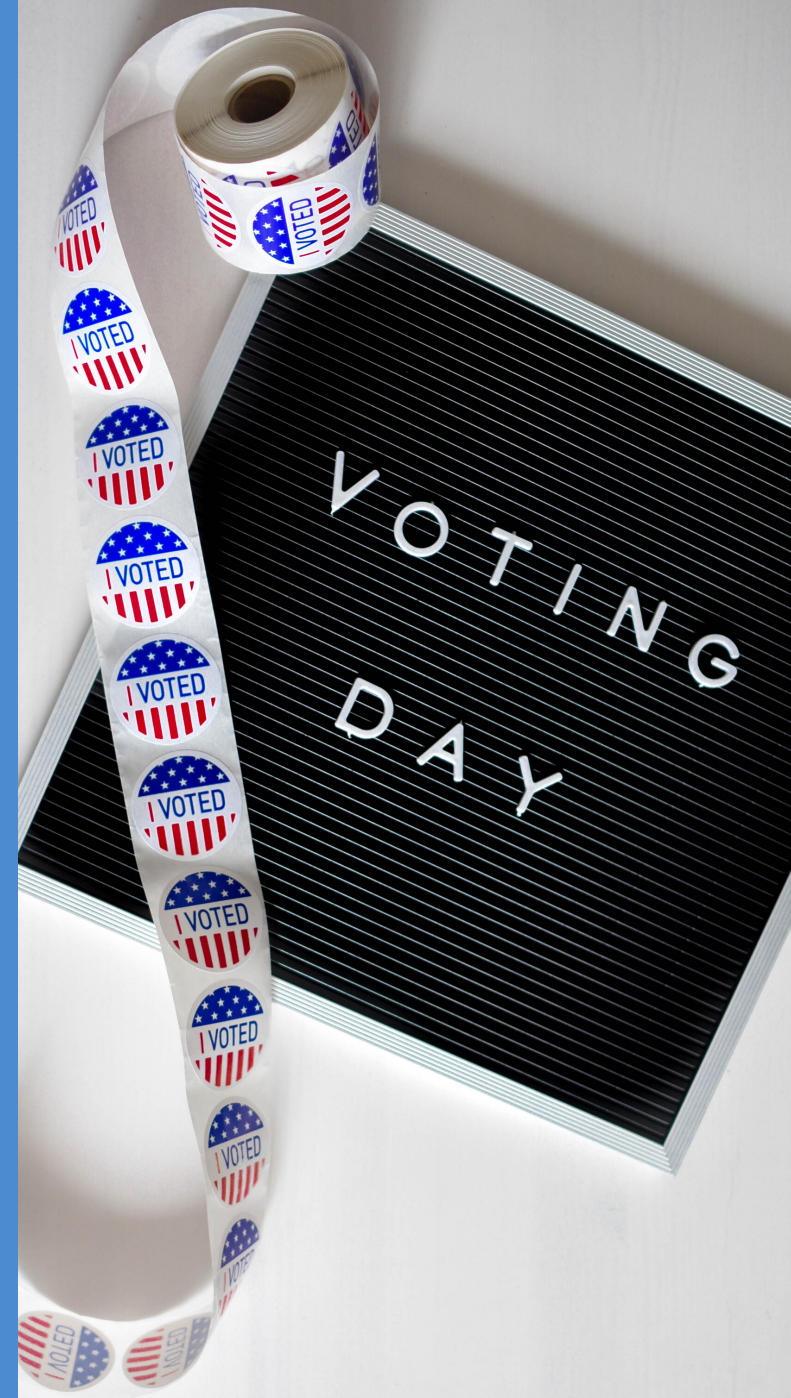

who are informed candidates?

- A candidate is anyone aspiring to be nominated for a position that holds political power.
- This can be at the local, regional, state, national or international level.

- Understands current local & global issues
- Uses informative research to aid in decision-making
- Prioritizes climate action & other related concerns.

1. WASTE MANAGEMENT

new facilities for residents to sell their recyclables and for composting organic waste

2. GREEN ENERGY

increased use of solar energy and a new waste-to-energy system that can generate electricity while managing municipal solid waste.

3. EDUCATION

Make a policy that all lights are to be turned off before leaving the building each night

4. LAND USE

If your building has sensors, make sure each of them are working properly

THE GAMBIA

President Adama Barrow

The Gambia has become only the second country whose climate goals are compatible with the Paris Agreement's 1.5 C temp increase.



Afforestation

A large project was launched to restore 10,000 hectares of forests, mangroves, & savannas



Renewable Energy

Large-scale solar PV projects are in progress to decrease reliance on fossil fuels.



Climate Resilience

Changes in land-use & agriculture are being made to protect against droughts & rising sea levels.

DENMARK

New Elected Parliament & Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen

The new climate law (2019) mainly focuses on changes in the Danish energy sector - a major contributor of carbon emissions.



Goals include: A reduction in carbon emissions that is 70% lower than 1990 levels by 2030 and independence from fossil fuels by 2050.



Denmark has the most ambitious climate targets in the EU & is pushing other countries to adopt similar goals, as well.



INDIA

President Ram Nath Kovind

1. India is currently the 3rd largest emitter of greenhouse gas emissions
2. India is developing the largest solar project in the world.
3. The switch to renewable energy is driven by ambitious clean energy policies & lower cost of solar technology.

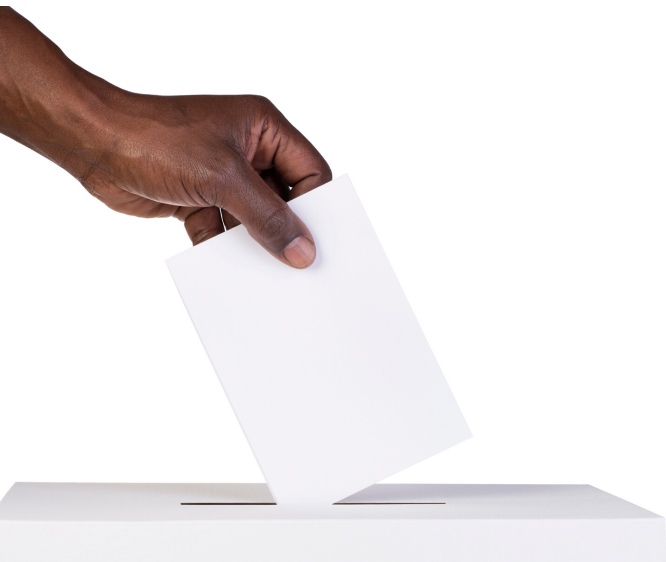

1 Do Your Research

Candidate Research

the act of researching and developing a full understanding of a candidate's experiences, voting history, and position on key issues before voting for them.



How are you getting your information?

- Social media? Television? Radio? Articles?
- Are these biased or unbiased sources?
- It's important to use many sources for a more accurate understanding of current issues and political candidates.

2 Choose a Candidate

Step 1: Find out who the potential candidates are.

Step 2: Study each candidates' past experiences and voting history.

- Are they informed? Do they support positive climate initiatives?

Step 3: See how third party organizations have rated and evaluated the candidates.





2 Choose a Candidate

Step 4: Research their financing & see who's funding their campaign.

- Do they receive funding from fossil fuel companies?

Step 5: Reach out to a candidate with any questions or concerns.

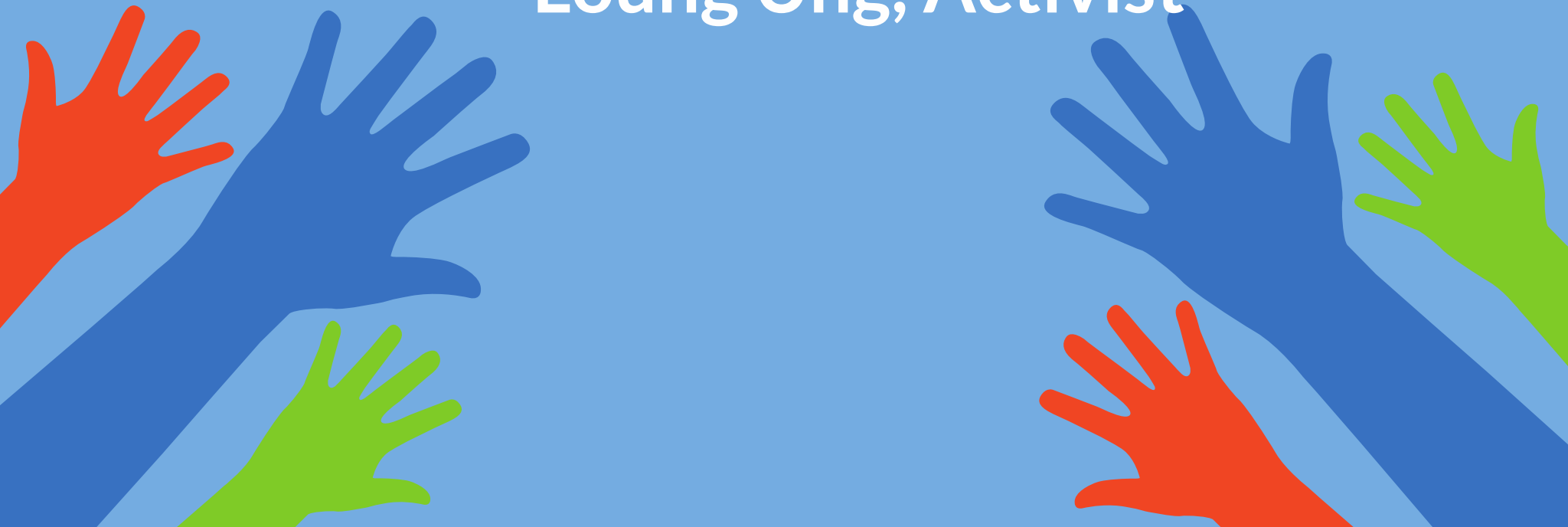

3 Show Up & Vote

- Registering to vote is often very quick & easy!
- Voter registration information can be found on country-specific government websites.
- Can't show up to vote?
 - Many countries offer voting by mail, or absentee ballots, to ensure everyone has an equal opportunity to vote.

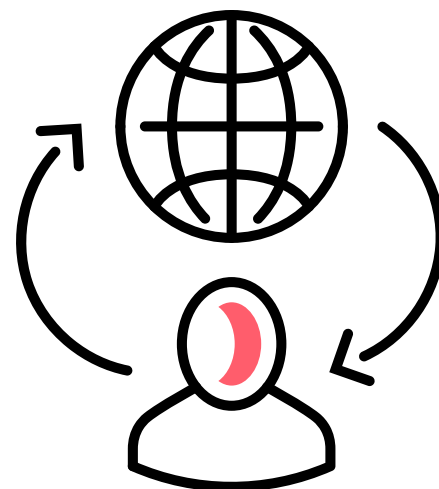
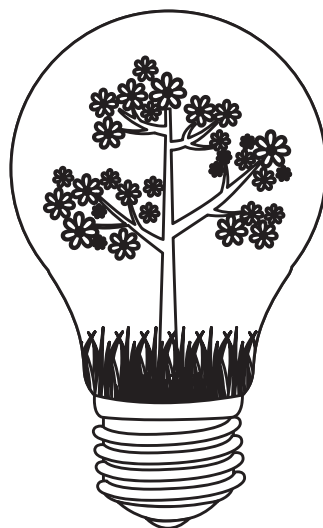
